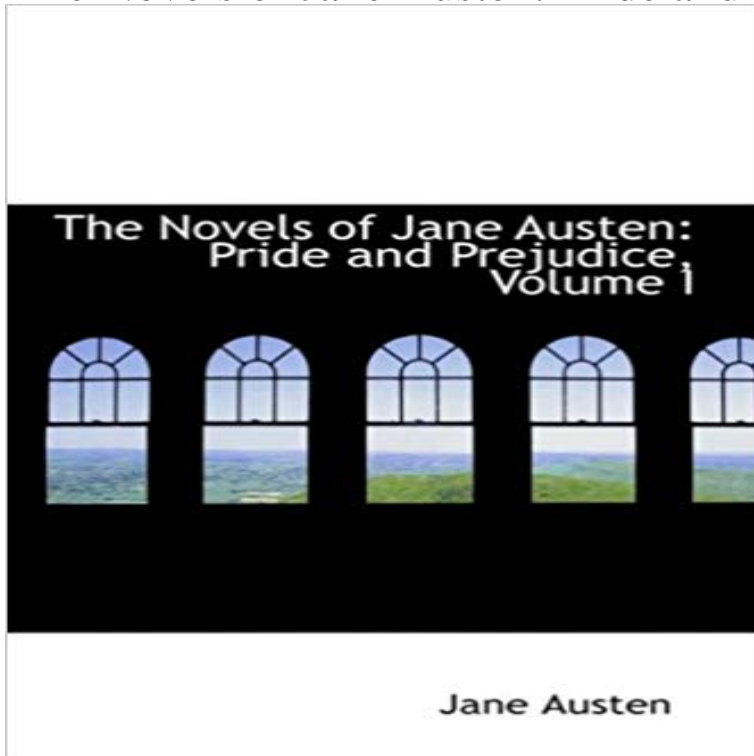


# The Novels of Jane Austen: Pride and Prejudice, Volume I
